

Medina's Bid Is In To Resign

FT. McPHERSON (Ga.) — (AP) — Capt. Ernest L. Medina, acquitted of murder charges in the slaying of more than 100 civilians at My Lai, submitted his resignation to the Army today.

The military attorney who helped defend him in the court-martial, Capt. Mark Kadish, said Medina was requesting an honorable discharge.

"Assuming that it is accepted, he will be out in two weeks," Kadish said.

The attorney read a one-sentence statement from Medina saying. "It is with deep sorrow and regret that after 16 years I leave the Army which has meant so much to me and my family."

Medina's civilian attorney, F. Lee Bailey, said in New York last week that Medina would work for him at the R. J. Enstrom Corp., a small helicopter manufacturer in Menoninee, Mich., in which Bailey owns the controlling interest.
