Kennedy pleaded guilty to leaving the scene of the accident, which he did not report for some nine hours. He received a two month suspended jail sentence, and was placed on probation for a year. On July 20, Kennedy announced he had decided to remain in the Senate and would seek re-election in 1970. While O'brien said he does not quarrel with Kennedy's announced position, he said the Massachusetts senator belongs on any list of prospective White House challengers.

The has proven himself outstanding in his role in the Senate and I can't believe that he will not continue to be looked to for leadership by many Democrats across the country, 'O'Brien said. O'Brien said Sen. Edmund S. Muskie of Maine and former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey are among others on the list of likely contenders.

**But let me hasten to add, there are many others, there are many young Democrats in the Congress and in the country, and I will predict in some of the statehouses . . and it' very very difficult to predict who may emerge in this regard .

*I've named some obvious names that would certainly be under serious consideration in 1972, in my judgment, but I want to underscore that also in my judgment other names will come forward for consideration, because that's the process, O'Brien said.
