Kennedy Inquest Witness Claims: Was a Whitewash' John Farrar, the scuba diver who pulled Mary Jo Kopechne's body from Sen. Ted Kennedy's sunken car,

and later testified at the secret inquest into her

hearing a "whitewash." Farrar said that the presiding judge, James A. Boyle, prevented him at the January inquest from explaining his theory about an

air pocket in the car. Farrar contends an air bubble may have kept the Kennedy secretary alive for a period of time after the four-door 1967 Oldsmobile plunged off Dyke Bridge on Chappaquiddick Island, Mass., last July.

The ENQUIRER also learned exclusively from an inquest witness that Judge Boyle purposely had certain testimony stricken from the record, without his intervention being noted in the official transcribe. transcript.

"The pieces of testimony that the judge had heard in court, but which will not appear in the record, may seem trivial individually," this witness noted. "But taken as a whole, the pieces of apparent trivia could add up to something important."

The ENQUIRER is withholding the informant's name because of Boyle's

informant's name because of Boyle's directive to witnesses not to talk about inquest proceedings outside of court. The directive carries with it an implied threat of a contempt of court citation for violators.

Farrar defended his remarks by explaining that none of them had been testimony.

The witness-informant told this newspaper: "During my evidence, Judge Boyle from time to time would wave down the stenographer with his arm to stop him from transcribing.

"The stenographer would stop, but the judge's action would not appear on the rec-ord because he did not say anything.

"During these stops, pieces of evidence were heard which did not go into the record, because Judge Boyle had signaled that these bits not be taken down.

"If the judge had heard the evidence, then said, 'Strike it from the record,' it would have been in the stenographer's record as such.

"But the way it is, the whole transcript will look like continuous evidence with no indication of the stoppage."

Farrar, the 32-year-old scuba diver summoned to the inquest — which was closed to press and public alike — later told The ENQUIRER:

"As far as I can see, this whole inquest was a whitewash. Even when the final report is released to the public, a lot will be left unsaid.

"Kennedy has managed to hide completely what has happened at that party (which preceded the fatal incident) and on the island.

"I was not allowed to talk about my theory of the air bubble which I believe could have been keeping Mary Jo alive (after the car submerged).

A Russian psychiatrist believes that dreams forecast illness. Dr. Vasily Kasatkin, 60, of Leningrad says he reached that conclusion after a 28-year study involving 8,000 dreams.

Dr. Kasatkin said that dreams may be reliable warnings of illness although there may be as much as a two-month lag between the dream and the diagnosis of a disease like tuberculosis.

Acute dysentery may give two days' notice, while bronchitis, influenza and gastritis may appear 24 hours following a tell-tale dream.

"She was in something like a sitting position in the overturned car.

"Her legs were in the front section and her body in the rear. Her hands were on the underside of the front seat, as if she had been holding her-self there to keep her head in a pocket of air.

"There was no air bubble in the car when I reached the girl, but she could have been alive for a good while after the car went off the bridge.

"I have read of cases of people in submerged cars who have lived for up to five hours by breathing a trapped pocket of air."
