# One Bullet Injured Brain Stem,

### TIE CEREBELLIM 3 PENETRATED

of Senator's Wound Rocalia Wound Inflicted on Fresident Kennedy

One of the bullets that felled Senator Robert F. Kennedy early yesterday was said by surgeons to have possibly injured a vital area of the brain known as the brain stem.

Different areas of the brain stem control functions as wakefulness, respiration, blood pressure and heart rate. It is also the "waystation" for sensory and motor information going to and from the brain through the spinal cord.

Just four and a half years go the Senator's brother President Kennedy was killed when an assassin's bullet tore through blood vessels in the back of the head and hit the

brain stem.
As further information became known yesterday about the extent of Senator Kennedy's injuries, neurosurgeons became increasingly pessimistic about his chances for survival

### Impairment Possible

Even survival left the possi-bility of permanent damage to his ability to coordinate his movements, to receive sensory information and to regain consciousness.

The Senator remained uncon-The Senator remained unconscious late yesterday following nearly four hours of surgery to remove fragments of bone and metal that had lodged in his brain. Unconscious persons can be kept alive for prolonged periods, and, if brain damage is not too severe, can regain consciousness weeks later and recover normal function.

Dr. Nat Downes Reid, neuro-surgeon at the University of California at Los Angeles, one of the surgeons who operated on Mr. Kennedy's brain, re-ported that the bullet had enbehind the right ear and had followed an upward, diagonal path toward the center of the

### Cerebellum Penetrated

The bullet penetrated the cerebellum—the part of the brain that controls balance and coordination—and tore the superior cerebellar artery, which feeds a portion of the cerebellum

A fragment of the bullet lodged near the upper part of the brain stem. This fragment was not removed in surgery because efforts to reach it could have further injured vital areas of the brain

Another of Mr. Kennedy's surgeons, Dr. Henry Cuneo of the University of Southern California, reported that the occipital lobe on the right side of the brain also had been injured. This lobe governs governs vision toward the left.

### Circulation of Stem

Dr. Cuneo, who made his report by telephone to Dr. J. Lawrence Pool, neurosurgeon at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center here, also said that the tearing of the superior cerebellar artery could have been very serious, because it may have affected the circulation of the brain stem.

It was not disclosed vester-

It was not disclosed yester-day whether any parts of Mr. Kennedy's brain had been de-prived of blood and oxygen for prolonged periods, which could result in death of the nerve cells in the deprived areas.

Dr. Pool said that, as far as was known yesterday, the portions of Mr. Kennedy's brain that control intellectual functions had not been damaged.

### CURB ON USE OF LAND IN CAPITAL IS BACKED

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)
—The Rules Committee today
cle tred for House debate a bill
to ban the use of Federal property in Washington for overnight campsites, such as that
now occupied by the Poor
People's Campaign.

The action came on a 9-to-6
vote, after the committee heard
conflicting arguments that
such a step could lead to violence or that it was necessary

such a step could lead to vio-lence or that it was necessary to prevent trouble.

The measure, previously ap-proved by the House Public Works Committee, would pro-hibit officials from issuing a permit for use of parkland or other property for camping, sleeping, sitting-in or other overnight occupancy or for for construction of temporary for construction of temporary buildings.

buildings.

It would also prohibit renewal or extension of the permit already authorized by the Interior Department for the Poor People's Campaign. The permit will expire June 16.

The measure would also set up a Senate-House Committee on Citizen Grievances to receive the oral or written petitions of citizens for redress of grievances. grievances.
