Gun-Toter Seized At Cathedral Door

NEW YORK (UPI) — A printing company salesman who had claimed to be a friend of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was taken into custody with an unloaded gun in his

possession at the main entrance of St. Patrick's Cathedral today 15 minutes before President Johnson arrived for Kennedy's funeral.

The man, identified by police as Gary J. Dedell, 30, of Syracuse, N.Y., was picked up by police during the routine search at the huge bronze doors to the cathedral. He was taken to a nearby police station house.

In Syracuse it was learned that Dedell had telephoned a reporter for the Syracuse Herald-Journal at his home at a bout midnight Wednesday and identified himself as "a friend of Bob Kennedy."

Dedell said he had just talked with a member of the Kennedy press staff in Los Angeles and been told that "everyone here expects Bobby Kennedy to die," it was learned.

Dedell was employed as a salesman for Kaufman-Dedell Printing Inc., Syracuse, believed to be a family firm.

Train Kills 2 Waiting for RFK

ELIZABETH, N.J. (AP) — A man and woman waiting for the special train bearing the body of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy to Washington were killed today by a train heading in the opposite direction.

Police said another woman was hurt and there may be more injured. The identities of the two killed were not immediately determined, police said. Police first reported three killed.

Police said the northbound Penn-Central train heading to New York from Chicago swept the two victims off a platform in the station and crushed them. The Kennedy train was passing through the station at about the same time.
