

Reagan Vetoes Bill On Kennedy Photos

SACRAMENTO — (AP) — A bill designed to prevent reproduction of the autopsy photos of the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy has been vetoed by Gov. Reagan. quarrel with the principal objective" of the bill. But he said medical researchers have indicated the measure might have a detrimental effect on scientific work.

His office, in announcing the veto today, released a statement in which he said the measure "is so broadly worded that it would have the unintended effect of impeding the legitimate use of autopsy photographs in medical education and research."

The measure, by Assemblyman James Bear, (D-San Diego), bans the copying of any photograph of a body taken during the post mortem examinations unless for use in court cases or except by court order.

While the measure didn't mention Kennedy by name, sponsors said it was aimed at preventing reproduction of the autopsy photos of the New York senator, who was assassinated in Los Angeles the night of the June primary.

Reagan said "I have no
