PENCILS, NOTEPAPER, KEYS, WALLET, HANDKERCHIEF ON A LONG TABLE. THE
DEPUTY TAKES YOUR PIPE APART TO VERIFY IT ISN'T A PISTOL OR KNIFE.
HE DISASSEMBLES YOUR LIGHTER AND INSPECTS THE COTTON WAKKING.
YOU LEAN FORWARD, HANDS ON TABLE, FEET APART. THE DEPUTY RUNS HIS
HANDS OVER YOUR COATSLEEVES, UNDER COLLAR AND LAPELS, UP THE BACK,
ALONG THE SEAMS, UP AND DOWN YOUR LEGS.
A SECOND DEPUTY MOVES A BLACK, PADDLE-SHAPED MATEL DETECTOR OVER
YOUR PERSON. ITS SQUEAL BECOMES LOUDER WHEN IT CROSSES YOUR BELT
BUCKLE AND THE CLIP THAT HOLDS YOUR COURTROOM PASS TO YOUR BREAST PICKET.
FOR WOMEN REPORTERS THE FRISKING IS A WORSE ORDEAL. ONE DESCRIBES
IT: WOMAN DEPUTY AND FRISKEE STEP INTO A SIDE ROOM. DEPUTY EMPTIES
NEWSWOMAN'S PURSE, INSPECTS SPECTACLES, SPECTACLES CASE, MAKE-UP KIT,
WALLET; FEELS UNDER SCARF OVER NEWSWOMAN'S HEAD.
DEPUTY UNZIPS BACK OF NEWSWOMAN'S DRESS, REACHES DOWN HER FRONT,
EXPLORES AREA UNDER, UH, BRASSIERE. NEWSWOMAN HOISTS SKIRT TO WAIST,
DEPUTY EYEBALLS HOSIERY AND GIRDLE.

POCKETS RELOADED, YOU'RE ADMITTED THROUGH ANOTHER LOCKED DOOR TO A LONG CORRIDOR. ON A LONG TABLE ARE 26 TELEPHONES SPECIALLY INSTALLED FOR NEWSMEN. THERE IS A DRINKING FOUNTAIN BUT NO COFFEE URN-AND NO RESTROMS. LEAVE THE SECURITY AREA AND YOU HAVE TO GO THROUGH THE FRISKING PROCESS ALL OVER TO GET BACK IN.

ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTIEN NEWSMEN ARE COVERING THE TRIAL. THEY REPRESENT EIGHT NEWS SERVICES, 19 U. S. NEWSPAPERS AND PAPERS IN CANADA, MEXICO, ENGLAND, FRANCE, GERMANY, SWITZERLAND, EGYPT, JAPAN AND AUSTRALIA. FIVE MAGAZINES, THE RADIO AND TELEVISION NETWORKS AND SEVERAL LOCAL STATIONS ARE REPRESENTED.

(LIKE UPI) AP/IS ASSIGNED TWO SEATS IN THE COURTROOM, BUT DURING JURY SELECTION USUALLY WAS ABLE TO USE BUT ONE. PROSPECTIVE JURORS WERE ASSIGNED THE OTHER. DURING TESTIMONY, BOTH SEATS ARE AVAILABLE.

THE OVERFLOW CROWD OF REPORTERS WATCHES THE PROCEEDINGS BY CLOSEDTIRE OF THE COURTROOM AIR CONDITIONER CARRIES THE SCENE TO THREE MONITOR SCREENS ON HIGH PEDESTALS. THE PICTURE IS A STEADY LONG SHOT, WITH STRAND HARDLY MORE THAN A DOT AND THE JURY OUT OF VIEW. SOUND MOST OF THE TIME IS ADEQUATE. IN THE AUXILIARY ROOM, TOO, DEPUTIES SEARCH NEWSMEN FOR CAMERAS AND RECORDERS.

PARSONS, NEAREST OF HIS THREE DEFENSE ATTORNEYS, LEGAL ACES ALL.
