MEMPHIS, Tenn. AP - James Earl Ray and his Birmingham,
Ala., lawyer met in the Shelby County jail today for the first
time since Ray was turned over to American Authorities in the
slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King.
Arthur J. Hanes, former Birmingham mayor, went to the
heavily guarded jail this morning. He was admitted to Ray's
steel-lined third-floor quarters after passing through cordons of
shotgun-toting sheriff's deputies.
Hanes arrived in Memphis by plane from New York shortly
before midnight Friday, after being denied a seat on the Air
Force jet which returned Ray from London nearly 24 hours earlier.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. AP - James Earl Ray, tucked safely behind

the most elaborate security sorein ever seen here, awaits the first

meeting with his lawyer since being removed from a London Jail.

The lawyer, arthur Hanes of Birmingham, Als., arrived

by plane from New York shortly before midnight Friday,

quickly got into a car and drove

to a downtown hotel-escorted by

six policemen.

Hanes told newsmen here he had calked briefly with Ray shortly

before his client was handed ever to United States authorities

for the Thursday flight to Memphis.

After being searched and massed through cordons of heavily

armed, helmeted sheriff's deputies, Hanes presumably will be

suntited to the third-floor cell block where Ray, charged with

the April 4 assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.,

is confined in the Shelby County Jail.

Quarter-inch steel plates cut off light and air from the

windows, and the hum of newly installed air conditioners provides

a quiet background for the talks.

There is a felephone at hand, and in the corridor there is a

sandbag-lined steel bor-the receptable for any bomb or explosive

In Lendon, meanwhile, police said they had evidence Ray
may have robbed a bank. They said the evidence is fingerprints
on a "give me cash" note handed a bank teller.
The note was handed to a teller in the Trustee Savings Bank
in London's Fulham District on June 4-two months to the day
after King was killed. The man escaped with about 100
pounds \$240-in five-pound notes.
When Ray was arrested four days later he had 60 pounds When Ray was arrested four days later he had 60 pounds in five-pound notes. He also had just bought a ticket to Brussels. A description of the robber given police by the bank manager matches Ray. The evidence was turned up as Scotland Yard prepared a dossier in an attempt to track down any hint in London of conspiracy in King's assassination.

British detectives said they could find nothing to indicate Ray had any association with possible confederates, political contacts or anyone else.
