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MEMPHIS, Tenn. AP -Neither the family of James Earl Ray
nor that of the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. has expressed an
interest in attending Ray's trial, a spokesman said today.
"We have received no requests from either the family of the
defendant or the deceased for seats in the courtroom," said Charles
Holmes, who is handling press relations for the trial.
Ray is scheduled to go on trial Nov. 12 for the murder of King
who was assassinated by a sniper's bullet last April 4.
Half of the 76 spectator seats in the small courtroom have been
set aside for the general public and the remainder for representatives
of the press.
No seats will be reserved for the public but it is customary at
trials here to give perference to the families involved if they decide
