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NASHVILLE (Tenn.) — (AP) — James Earl Ray, the convicted assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., says in a letter published in the Tennessean that he has been trying for two years to be released from solitary confinement at the state prison here.

The letter, published yesterday, was in response to an earlier story in the news-paper in which prison war-den Jim Rose said: "Ray now prefers to stay in his cell and work on his ap-peals."

Ray said his letter was written "to keep this latest fabrication from being alleged in court with any degree of credebility with pos-

leged in court with any de-gree of credability with pos-sible corroborating witness-es and perhaps again delay confinement relief."

In March 1969, Ray was sentenced to 99 years in prison after he pleaded guilty to shooting King at Memphis the year before. He later was denied a new He later was denied a new
