Author Wins Right to Interview

A federal judge ordered the Bureau of Prisons yes-terday to permit an author to interview John Larry ƙay, brother of convicted as-sassin James Earl Ray, at the federal penitentiary at Marion III Marion, Ill.

King Jr. John Ray, 39, who is serv-ing an 18-year prison term for a 1970 bank robbery, has been quoted as saying his older brother told him "I am not the only one in on this," indicating that the 1968 murder was the result

1968 murder was the result of a conspiracy.

In Nashville, James Ray failed in his effort to block his transfer from a state prison to a federal penitentiary. U.S. District Court Judge L. Clure Morton on Wednesday denied Ray's petition for a temporary restraining order blocking the straining order blocking the move.
