yesterday. Harold Harold Weisberg, a Frederick, Md., author, said documents he obtained from the FBI in a Freedom of Information suit show that the rifle allegedly used to kill King could not have been fired from the window.

Weisberg presented his argument at a news conference called by Rep. John Conyers (D-Mich.), who said that many questions remain to be answered about the Memphis murder of the civil rights leader in April, 1968.

Weisberg described himself as an investigator for James Earl Ray, who pleaded guilty to the assassination but who

now contends he was framed and is seeking a trial.

a Weisberg yesterday produced a message from the FBI laboratory which reported no evidence of powder burns on the sill of the window. He said an expert on criminal evidence would testify that a rifle could not have been fired from that
