

McGOVERN ASKS CURB ON F.B.I. ON CAMPUS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP) —Citing his own survey of police chiefs, student leaders and college administrators, Senator George S. McGovern has urged that agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation be barred from campus investigations unless invited in by local authorities.

The South Dakota Democrat indicated that if the Justice Department failed to adopt the proposal as policy, he would introduce legislation to force the issue.

Only three weeks ago, President Nixon signed a bill authorizing immediate F.B.I. jurisdiction in campus bombings or burnings.

But most of the 90 police chiefs, 111 college presidents and 120 student presidents who responded to Mr. McGovern's survey said that they opposed having Federal agents act on their own initiative in such incidents.

Results of the survey were released today.

At the same time, Mr. McGovern wrote to Attorney General John N. Mitchell to ask that "the decision to send agents onto a campus . . . be conditioned on the approval or request of the college president or local police officials."

That sentiment was reflected in the survey by 69 per cent of the police chiefs, 83 per cent of the college presidents and 98 per cent of the student leaders.
