

U.S. Frees Foe of Castro, Tells Him to Halt Violence

MIAMI, Oct. 30 (AP)—Felipe Rivero, the anti-Castro leader, ordered banished from the United States for heading an exile group advocating violence, was released from jail Monday on \$10,000 bail and the condition he behave himself.

Robert Wyotych, district director of the United States Immigration Service, said Rivero was ordered released on condition he and other members of the Cuban Nationalist Association discontinue bombings and similar acts of violence.

Rivero had been in the Dade County jail since May 12, when he was arrested after reports that his group planned to bomb the Cuban pavilion at Expo 67 in Montreal. Expo closed Sunday.

Rivero, a Cuban refugee, still faces the Immigration Service order excluding him from the country. His attorney, Gino Negretti, said he would continue to fight it.
