Politicians ignore anarchy from right wing

While politicians rant about anarchy on the left and right, their sights are lowered on the left. Other groups that promise "to restore order by whatever means necessary" are ignored.

On September 20 four anti-Castro Cubans and a salesman from Brooklyn were arrested when they set off smoke bombs and tear gas during a New York premier performance of "The Cuban Thing", a play by Jack Gelber. Several hundred people had to flee the Henry Miller Theater, coughing and weeping at the Cuban gesture.

Thirty plainclothes police and

the chief inspector had been tipped off and were seated in the theater. Three of the Cubans had been arrested last August for throwing bombs at anti-war demonstrators who were marching in Times Square.

A week ago anti-Castro Cubans fired shots at the Polish ship Polanca in Miami harbor. The United States Department had to make a formal apology to the Polish government for the incident.

In Miami's Little Havana section a pre-dawn explosion shattered windows in four stores located in a building whose owner had recently evicted the Second Front-Alpha 66, an anti-Castro revolutionary organization. A group calling itself "La Organizacion Revolucionaria Cellular" claimed "credit" for the bombing and issued a statement for the press: "In the face of the apathy that this exiledom is suffering ... we will punish all who deserve it."

Terrorist anti-Castro Cubans have been responsible for the summer bombings of tourist offices and consulates of several nations having diplomatic or trade relations with Cuba. It was hoped these attacks would put a strain on relations between America and the countries trading with Cuba and stir up more attacks on American foreign policy.

A year ago in Los Angeles forty Cubans, armed with bats, attacked Peace Action Council's Hiroshima Day Parade down Wilshire Boulevard. More recently, a Cuban exiles' newspaper has begun to appear around Los Angeles.

The paper, AMERICA LIBRE, is an inspiring, anti-Castro, anti-Communist, propaganda organ. "To achieve the liberation of Cuba we must try everything," it says. It advocates international murder and predicts that Castro will be assassinated within a year.

In one issue of AMERICA LIBRE the 'Paisano' column listed readers' suggestions of different ways to murder Fidel Castro. Among the suggestions Paisano collected were: "Cut off his head with a saw", "roast him in an oven", "bash his head in with a bat". Paisano concludes: "Do you have any suggestions on how to eliminate Fidel Castro, write: America Libre (Paisano), P.O. Box 75858, Sandford Station, Los Angeles 90005."

Fidel-haters may find Paisano's column amusing but after Sirhan Sirhan many people in Los Angeles have had more than enough of undesirable aliens coming here to commit their political crimes. Murder is murder no matter what political ideology you have.

The anti-Communist Cubans have been engaged in their terror campaign for several years. If Garrison is right, there were Cubans involved in President Kennedy's assassination.

500,000 Cuban refugees have come to America since Castro took state power and they continue to enter at the rate of 4,000 immigrants a month. Obviously, only a few are involved in terrorism.

Many of the immigrants settle in Miami. There they provide half of the hotel employees, and sixty percent of the garment

industry. In one airplane engine plant there are 1,500 Cuban mechanics.

The Cuban refugees were classified "temporary guests" when they arrived in the United States. In 1966 legislation was passed to give them permanent resident alien status. In the last eight years less than 7,000 have been naturalized.

The stated objective of the Cuban anti-Communists is to influence U.S. foreign policy, to disrupt our friendly relations with other nations and, if possible, get the Marines to go liberate their island for them. Since the CIA Bay of Pigs fiasco, such groups as Ejercito Libertador, Cuban Power, and Second Front-Alpha 66 have hit lean financial times.

If we were to use the words of the McCarran Act (which has only been applied to REDS and PINKOS) we could describe the Cuban anti-Castro anti-Communist groups as an alien re-

volutionary conspiracy which uses violent tactics of espionage and sabotage to overthrow an existing government. Relatively few in numbers, they give scant indication of ability to achieve their ends by lawful means. These groups present a clear and continuing danger to the internal security of the United States.

They dream of American boys being drafted to fight their war in Cuba.
