

**DREAM OF RETURNING
DIMMING FOR CUBANS**

MIAMI (Reuters)—Although an estimated total of 54 Cuban exile groups operate in this Florida resort, most would prefer to stay here even if Fidel Castro's regime was overthrown, according to a study.

Dr. Reinhold Wolff, a University of Miami economist, made an exhaustive study of most exile groups, including half a dozen militant organizations accused of using dynamite and plastic explosives in a "reign of terror."

The aim of the militants is to return to a "free" Cuba, but Mr. Wolff contends that most other exiles who have settled here enjoy the physical comforts of Miami.

Still, they profess a desire to return to Cuba if Mr. Castro is overthrown, rather than to provoke unpopularity among the exile community, Mr. Wolff said.

The police have investigated 36 bombings or attempted bombings believed to have been carried out by Cuban exiles

this year. For every one reported, a half dozen, it is believed, go unpublicized. The victims are reported to fear reprisals or unwanted publicity.
