

Cuban Reply Assails the Swiss For Protest on Demonstrators

MIAMI, May 22 (AP) — Cuba has sent a sharp note to Switzerland, the Havana radio reported today, accentuating suddenly deteriorating relations between the two nations as an indirect result of the kidnaping of 11 Cuban fishermen by Cuban exiles based in the United States.

Also as an aftermath of the incident, the broadcast monitored here, said, one of the last remaining Western correspondents in Havana has left. He was Andrew Tarnowski, correspondent for Reuters, the British news agency.

The Cuban Foreign Minister, Raul Roa, replied to a note from the Swiss Foreign Minister, Pierre Graber, which protested Cuban demonstrations in

front of the Swiss Embassy in Havana over the fishermen. The embassy handles matters concerning the United States, which does not maintain relations with Cuba.

Mr. Graber's note suggested that Premier Fidel Castro had staged the demonstrations to divert attention from his failure to reach a 10-million-ton sugar harvest on which he had staked the honor of his revolution.

Mr. Roa said in his reply, delivered to the Swiss Ambassador, Alfred Fischli, that Switzerland "has assumed the same attitude and talked the same language as the imperialists and their agents."

The fishermen were released by the anti-Castro group, Alpha 66, after Washington had expressed displeasure.
