

3 SEIZED IN MIAMI AS BOMB SUSPECTS

Planting of Device Charged in Latest Episode in Area

MIAMI, May 8—Two Cubans and an American were arrested early today in the city's Cuban section as they were allegedly placing a powerful dynamite bomb in a business establishment.

In an effort by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Miami police and the Dade County Public Safety Department to halt a wave of terrorism attributed by the authorities to Cuban exiles.

In the last 20 months, about 100 bombs have exploded in the Miami area, one of them in front of the F.B.I. Building.

In addition, four Cuban exile leaders and one businessman have been killed, several attempts have been made to kill prominent exiles and a number of newsmen, both Cubans and Americans, have received death threats.

Last Friday, Emilio Milian, a Cuban-American radio commentator, who has combated terrorism, lost both legs when a bomb connected to the ignition of his car exploded.

Investigators theorize that the terrorists are members of extremist groups, either of the right or the left, or both.

A few hours after their arrest, Antonio Raphael De La Cova, 25 years old; Blas Jesus Corbo, 21, and Gary Edward Latham, 27, were arraigned on a variety of Federal charges, including bomb possession, attempted bombing and conspiracy to bomb, before a United States magistrate, who set bond

at \$200,000 on each and scheduled preliminary hearings for May 14. They also face state charges.

There was no immediate explanation of a connection of Mr. Latham, an American student, with the two Cubans. This afternoon, the police found explosives in Mr. Latham's apartment in Boca Raton.

Also, a number of Cuban exiles were questioned by Federal and local investigators, and several houses in Miami were searched.

"The arrests this morning are connected with other acts of violence here and are the results of a lengthy surveillance of groups suspected of being involved in terrorist bombings," said Julius L. Mattson,

special agent-in-charge of the Miami F.B.I. office.

The F.B.I. has reportedly been ordered to make a determined antiterrorist effort by Attorney General Edward H. Levi. A joint group to combat violence, made up of about 50 F.B.I. agents and 50 local investigators, has been formed here.

Brothers Killed in Fire

THOMPSON, No. 2, Pa., May 6 (UPI) — Two young brothers were killed today when a pre-dawn blaze swept through their two-story duplex home in this worked-out coal mining town in southwestern Pennsylvania. Officials at nearby Brownsville Hospital identified the victims as Tyler Bush, 2 years old and Thomas Bush Jr., 3.
