

Gen. Walker Addresses Bay Colleges

Retired Army General Edwin Walker, whose ultra-conservative views led to his resignation from the Army, fired a few rounds yesterday, some at national and international targets.

The peppery 54-year old general told reporters at the Athens Athletic Club in Oak-

land that he is a member of the John Birch Society and has been for five years.

APPEARS AT COLLEGE

He added that the Society is not sponsoring his speaking tour of the East Bay "but I would be perfectly happy if they did."

Last night he appeared at

the Diablo Valley College, Concord.

Predicting that "a big tide in favor of the conservative right" will sweep Senator Barry Goldwater to presidential victory, Walker said:

"You all got the picture at the Cow Palace. Thirty years

of the other kind of government is asked."

He said further of Goldwater: "He's in the right direction. I'm for anyone against Johnson."

Walker said he didn't have any sympathy for ousted Premier Khrushchev, although this has been "a most serious change."

"And I don't like the Kennedy clan and all they stand for."

Accompanying the general were two members of the John Birch Society, Republican William Van Mastrigt, who is opposing State Senator George Miller in the 17th State Senatorial district in Contra Costa county; and Jack Azevedo, Republican candidate against incumbent Democratic Assemblyman Jerome Waldie, 10th district, Contra Costa County.

The general will give a noontime address, sponsored by the Honor Students Society, at the UC Berkeley campus today. Tomorrow at 8 p.m., he will speak on "America's no win policy" in the Cubberly Auditorium at Stanford University.
