## A Ban on Handguns

Attorney General Edward 1/s. Levi, reversing a sixyear administration stand against tougher gun lcontrols, called yesterday for banning handgun possession outsiae a person's home ory business in high crime areas of the nation.

Levi's proposal also would make it illegal to sell or transfer handguns and ammunition in the high crime areas as well as to import0 them there.

. Declaring that "the handgun has become the denominator of much of the vio-lence that besets us," Levi told a narcotics conference of police officials here that state, local and federal laws have proven to be insufficient.

Levi's detailed proposal is likely to increase the pros-pects for adoption of gun contrl legislation in the current session of Congress.

Levi's suggestion seemed to go significantly further President Ford's stance on gun control, expressed as recently as March 23 in an interview with wthe Los Angeles Times. He said then that the only proposal "that looks at all like the right one is one that would ban so-called Saturday night specials" — cheap handguns that figure prominently in violent crimes.

administration sources said Levi's speech tad been "run through" the White House.

Levi's proposal called for the handgun ban to be triggered by a local violent crime rate "significantly higher" than the national average or by a high local rate that had climbed significantly over a one-year period.

Such a regional mechanism, Levi said, "strikes only in places where the need for handgun control has been clearly demon-

trated by a critical level of tiolence."

If the law had been in eflect in 1972 and had required t violent crime rate 20 per tent higher than the national average of one ten per cent ligher than the national avtrage and five per cent highthan the 1971 local rate, 2 metropolitan areas would have been affected. Levi aid. These would have inluded Los Angeles, San rancisco, New York City, Vashington, D. C., Chicago und Baltimore.

In the covered areas, a tandgun owner "would be equired to obtain a special permit of extremely limited duration if he wanted to ransport his weapon outside is home or business for a egitimate reason," Levi old his law enforcement aulience.

To be effective, Levi said, he ban would have to be imposed "for a period of years ince crime in a metropolitan area reached critical evels."

Levi said the law could oprate with a three-part pen-

alty structure. First-timeviolators could be subject to "a high civil penaly plus confiscation of the weapon. a punishment that Levi said some law enforcement officials had advised him would be insufficient because prosecutors would not take seriously "such a mild sanc-

But Levi said that judges would not hesitate to impose a non-jail nenalty on firsttime gun violators who were otherwise law-abiding citi-

The two-time violator could be subject to "a snort prison term, while a third offense or any violation of the laws gun-running provisions could be liable to "a stiff criminal penalty, Levi said.

The Attorney General said his regional handgun ban would cover not just central cities, but also their sub-

"More than half the murders in America — perhaps 10,000 in 1973 - are committed by persons using handguns, Levi said.
