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Undercover Man Testifies He Was to Bomb Draft Foe

An undercover detective testified in State Supreme Court yesterday that an alleged rightwing extremist gave him an orange-juice can filled with TNT to detonate on the doorstep of purported draft-resistance leader.

Following instructions of his Police Department superiors, the detective, William Plackenmeyer, substituted a can filled with soap, he testified. He identified the intended victim as Carl J. Henke of 32 East 12th Street, a Draft Resistance Movement member.

Detective Plackenmeyer's testimony highlighted the open-ing of the trial of William Hoff, a 35-year-old machinist, of 277 Warren Street, Brooklyn.

He and Paul Dommer, 30, an electrician of 25-89 36th Avenue, Astoria, Queens, were indicted last October on charges of plotting to murder 158 persons they had labeled "active leftists" in civil-rights and left-wing groups

Dommer Pleaded Guilty

Dommer pleaded guilty last February to conspiracy in the third degree and is awaiting sentence. Hoff is serving a jail

sentence. Hoff is serving a jail sentence on a gun charge in Brooklyn. He waived trial by jury on the nine-count indictment. His case is being heard by Justice Theodore R. Kupferman, a former United States Representative.

Samuel S. Yasgur, assistant district attorney, told the court that the defendant had boasted to the undercover detective that he had hurled a concussion grenade into a "Negro bar" in Newark during riots that followed the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in the spring of 1968. of 1968.

Detective Plackenmeyer said he had heard Hoff declare that two persons at the bar

probably were injured.

'Test' Awaited Detective

The detective testified also that Hoff had listed among other intended victims Mrs. Carolyn Elizabeth Goodman, mother of Andrew Goodman, one of three civil rights workers murdered in Mississippi in 1964; her husband, Robert, who died last May 20, and Richard A. Garza, former Socialist party candidate for Governor.
