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WITH WARREN COMMISSION (180)

DALLAS, SEPT.27 (AP)-A CHILLING 57-DEGREE NORTH WIND AND INTERMITTENT RAIN SHARPLY REDUCED TODAY THE USUAL NUMBER OF SUNDAY VISITORS AT THE SPOT WHERE PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY WAS ASSASSINATED NOV.22.

THE HANDFUL OF VISITORS--ALL FROM OUT OF TOWN--SAID THEIR PILGRIMAGE TO THE SCENE WAS NOT CONNECTED WITH THE WARREN COMMISSION REPORT ON THE ASSASSINATION.

"I HAVE BEEN WANTING TO GET DOWN HERE FOR A LONG TIME," SAID J.J. ZUFALL OF MUSKOGEE, OKLA., "AND THIS WAS THE FIRST CHANCE I'VE HAD."

THE FOCAL POINT OF ATTENTION WAS THE FLORAL DISPLAY WHICH IS CONTINUALLY REPLENISHED BY VISITORS. A HEAVY OVERNIGHT RAIN LEFT SOME OF THE ARTIFICIAL FLOWERS STREAKED AND FADED AND DIMMED THE MANY HANDWRITTEN NOTES ATTACHED TO THE BOUQUETS.

TWO LOUISIANA SCHOOL CHILDREN--WILDA O'STEEN, 15, AND HER BROTHER, THOMAS L. O'STEEN, 13, OF BOSSIER CITY--SHIVERED IN THE COLD WIND AS THEY PEERED UP AT THE WINDOW IN THE TEXAS SCHOOL BOOK DEPOSITORY BUILDING WHERE THE SHOTS WERE FIRED.

THEY SAID THEY DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT THE WARREN REPORT BUT THAT THEY WANTED TO VISIT THE SPOT WHERE THE PRESIDENT HAD BEEN SLAIN.

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
