When our office was in the Chronicle building I had full access to both the Examiner and Chronicle morgues, which on the whole are less than satisfactory unless you are looking for a specific subject which they happen to have clipped and filed. As far as I know, neither morgue has an index. They clips news items, date them with a stamp, and then stuff them into manila envelopes which are kept in boxes stacked alphabetically. The envelopes serve as the index. I still have theoretical access to these dubious files as an AP man, but our office is now a couple of miles away in the Fox Plaza building and it is a chore to go over there, massuming one can find the time to do it.

You now have sent us quite a lot of copied material and we have lost track of how much it might amount to. To relieve you of whatever financial burden this may involve, I'm enclosing a small check which should put things more or less right, I hope.

You are welcome to see any of our early files and to make copies except in certain rare cases, but it is difficult if not impossible for us to guess accurately your needs. Some time when you are here perhaps we can discuss this and work out some sort of a system.

It appears to demonstrate that neither of us is to be trusted except to collect stuff. We are all packrats, of course; perhaps it's just that some of us are rattier than others.
