Credibility Gap in Plot On Nixon

NEW YORK — (UPI) — Acting Brooklyn District Attorney Elliot Golden was reported today to be having doubts about the credibility of his star witness in the alleged plot to assassinate President-elect Nixon.

The New York Times today quoted Golden as saying: "There is already some reasonable doubt about the informant developing." It quoted other authorities as saying a re-evaluation of the case was taking place.

The Times identified Mohamed Hossan Algamal, 36, as the man who allegedly tipped police to the plot.

Acting on Algamal's information, police Saturday raided the Brooklyn apartment of the defendants Ahmed Namer, 43, and his two sons Hussein, 20, and Abdo, 18. Algamal allegedly told the police the Namers had tried to enlist his aid in the plot.

The Times said Algamal lived with the Namers in their three-room apartment in the East New York section of Brooklyn but recently had a falling out with them and was ordered to move.

The paper also said Golden was investigating charges Algamal was involved in certain activities in California and was forced to leave by the Yemeni community there.
