## Nixon Chat With Demonstrators Contained a Lesson, Aide Said

NEW CONCORD, Ohio, May 31 (UPI) — President Nixon made small talk about football and surfing to put college protesters at ease in a confrontation at the Lincoln Memorial May 9, but he really wanted to help them to understand the "lessons of history," Ronald L. Ziegler, White House press secretary, said today.

It was the first indication that the White House was chafing over reports by some of the student dissenters that Mr. Nixon talked about football and surfing in their unexpected dialogue with him when he showed up at the monument at 4:30 A.M. the morning of their demonstration against his decision to move into Cambodia.

Mr. Ziegler said in a commencement address at Muskingham College that Mr. Nixon wanted to leave the protesters with some thoughts about the basic questions that face their generation in the future.
