At 8:10 a full alert lasting five minutes was sounded, but here in Hanoi no bombs or guns were heard. The city was silent. The antiaircraft crews were at their posts.

At 8:59 the loudspeakers said the enemy had flown off.

The morning newspapers, published before President Nixon announced the new American bombing and mining campaign, discussed what they believed to be the options open to the United States.
