MOSCOW, May 16 — The Soviet Union opened a publicity campaign today to justify its scheduled talks with President Nixon next week against the background of the mining of North Vietnamese ports.

In the first authoritative analysis of Mr. Nixon's visit, a leading television commentator alluded to unidentified forces that sought to deter Moscow throm going ahead with the scheduled meeting.
