Some Havana Suggestions Called 'Fairly Reasonable' -Swiss Represent U.S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27-The State Department announced today that negotiations on an accord to halt the hijacking of airliners to Cuba began in Havana last Saturday with the Swiss Ambassador there representing the United States

Ambassador Silvio Mesnata, whose Government represents United States interests in Cuba in the absence of diplomatic relations between Havana and Washington, met with the Cuban Foreign Minister, Raul Roa García.

John F. King, a spokesman for the State Department, said the Ambassador's report was received here during the weekend and was under study.

Other State Department officials said the report conveyed some proposals from Cuba that appeared to be "fairly reasonable." But, they added, it will take at least until the end of the week before the United States is ready to forward its comments to Havana.

"I think we can live with the Cuban proposals, but we still need a number of clarifi-
