More Votes Than in '64

While Mr. Nixon beat Mr. McGovern by more votes than Mr. Johnson's 15,951,296 margin over Mr. Goldwater, more votes were cast this year, lowering the percentage.

Mr. Nixon got 61.8 per cent of the votes cast for the two major parties, compared with Mr. Johnson's 61.3 in a two-man accounting of the 1964 vote, when third party voting was smaller.

Mr. Nixon's total this year lowers and was John G. Schmitz, who took up the American party banner from Mr. Wallace and polled 1,080,-541 votes. Dr. Benjamin Spock, the antiwar People's party candidate, was next with 78,801.

election this fall, according to the official vote totals.

Mr. Nixon polled 47,042,923 votes in the Nov. 7 election, compared with 29,071,629 for the Democratic nominee Senator George McGovern. An assortment of other candidates got 1,345,504.

The figures were complied by The Associated Press from official totals certified by each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia as the official canvassing was completed today.

The Nixon victory margin was 17,971,294, the largest in history, but his percentage of the vote cast was 60.7, falling short of the record percentage of 61.1 captured by Lyndon B. Johnson in 1964 over Barry Goldwater.

Electoral Vote Loss

The popular vote indicated that the electoral vote would be 521 for Mr. Nixon and 17 for Mr. McGovern, who carried only Massachusetts and the District of Columbia. This is second only to the magnitude of Franklin D. Roosevelt's victory in 1936 over Alfred M. However, when the electors wet Monday to cast their ballots, Mr. Nixon got only 517 votes, instead of 521, as Alaske's three Republican elector in Virginia broke ranks to vote for the Libertarian party candidate, John G. Schmitz, who took up the American party banner from
