Nixon's Pick for U.S. Treasurer

President Nixon yesterday nominated Francine Neff, a Republican committeewoman from New Mexico, to be treasurer of the United States.

The nomination maintains the tradition that the job is given to a woman. Since 1949, the seven persons who have held the job have been women.

Mrs. Neff, 48, of Albuquerque, has been a GOP national committeewoman since 1970 and would succeed Romana Acosta-Banuelos, who served from December, 1971, until February 14.

Mr. Nixon also announced that he is nominating Treasury Secretary William Simon to fill four positions left vacant when George Shultz

resigned. Simon would become U.S. governor of the Asian Development Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank, the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

Mr. Nixon also announced the appointment of Gerald L. Parsky, a one-time member of Mr. Nixon's of old law firm of Mudge, Rose, Guthrie and Alexander between 1968 and 1971, to be deputy undersecretary of the Treasury. Parsky, 31, has served since 1973 as an executive assistant to Simon in his capacity as deputy Treasury secretary, federal energy administrator and now Treasury secretary.

Both the Neff and Parsky nominations are subject to Senate confirmation.
