

## Anti-Nixon Slogans Appear in Timahoe As the Visit Nears

DUBLIN, Oct. 2—Anti-Nixon slogans were painted on walls in the County Kildare village of Timahoe today, a day before President Nixon was due to arrive in Ireland, and pictures of him, with offensive slogans, were pasted on telephone poles there.

Irish police and United States security men planned additional precautions today in the face of growing opposition to the visit.

The tightening of security came after a statement was issued by the Quaker Society of Ireland condemning the use of "military, political or economic force in world affairs," and members of the Irish Republican Army, which is outlawed, tore down a fence surrounding a cemetery the President will visit Monday.

Irish Quakers are expected to voice disapproval of the United States involvement in South Vietnam more strongly tomorrow when the 1,700-member society holds its annual meeting here.

Victor Bewley, a leading member of the society, in a letter to the three main Dublin newspapers, expressed regret that President Nixon had been asked to dedicate a memorial stone to the Irish Quaker community.

"As a Quaker I feel that this is completely inappropriate and totally unacceptable," wrote Mr. Bewley, a Dublin business.

The President will dedicate

the stone in Timahoe, where the Irish Republican Army members tore down the fence and gate surrounding the burial ground. Today the police placed a round-the-clock guard on the cemetery, where John Milhouse, the President's first-known Irish ancestor, is buried.

Several organizations opposed to the United States' role in South Vietnam plan to hold demonstrations here Sunday. They include the Republican Sinn Fein party, the Dublin regional council of the Labor party and student groups.
