## Salinger in McGovern's Camp

Senator George McGovern's newest recruit in his fast-growing campaign to win the Democratic Presidential nomination is Pierre Salinger, who will join the McGovern camp this week.

Mr. Salinger, who served as President Kennedy's press secretary and was active in Robert F. Kennedy's Senatorial campaign, said he was convinced that Mr. McGovern is a far stronger candidate than polls indicate.

"He's best in a confrontation situation," he said in New York. "Remember him in the debate before the California caucus at the 1968 convention, when he absolutely demolished Hubert and Gene?"

Mr. Salinger indicated that by joining the McGovern organization, he won't be jeopardizing his reputation as a Kennedy family standby. He believes, he said, that Senator Edward M. Kennedy is sincere in declaring he is not a candidate.

The exact nature of Mr. Salinger's role in the McGovern campaign will be determined this week in Washington, Mr. Salinger said.

Georgia legislator and civil rights advocate Julian Bond has honorary degrees aplenty—eight, to be exact, and he's due to pick up two more soon. But today he'll receive a degree that really counts—his own earned bachelor's degree in English. Mr. Bond dropped out of Morehouse College in Atlanta nearly 11 years ago, in his senior year, to devote full time to the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. Recently he completed all requirements for a degree by writing a term paper titled "The Crisis in Education," and now, at age 31, he becomes a college graduate.
