.... Carol Feraci, who was quietly ushered out of the President's home after she read an anti-war message during a concert by the Ray Coniff Singers. The 30-year-old Miss Feraci admitted at her Van Muys home today that she probably wouldn't play the White House again.

The young woman said the President was smiling as she walked in with the singing group with which she had signed for a one-time performance, but when she pulled an anti-war sign from the top of her dress, quote, "I saw a look come across his eyes like "Ch my God!" but she noted the President remained smiling and composed. She said she put the sign down, which read "Stop the killing," and then walked up to a microphone 20 feet away from the President and said, "President Mixon, stop bombing human beings, animals and vegetation."

Miss Feraci was asked what she thought of the comment of Martha Mitchell, that she should be torn limb from limb. Says Miss Feraci, "Mrs. Mitchell is the wife of the head of law enforcement in the United States, responsible for law and order. He not only can't keep his own wife quiet, but she wants to go back to the rack and tear people limb from limb who disagree with her."

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Well, that girl who stepped from a chorus line to protest the Vietnam war to President Nixon's face, doesn't think she'll get a chance for a re-engagement. The story now from Dan Blackburn.

[Blackburn] Carol Feraci, the young singer who spoke out against the Administration's Vietnam policies during a White House concert Friday night, says she would do it again if given the chance but doesn't think she will be invited back. The 30-year-old singer had signed on with the Ray Coniff Singers for the White Louse appearance, and when the group came on the White House stage she pulled out an anti-war sign and called on the President to stop bombing in Vietnam.

Afterward Martha Mitchell, wife of the Attorney General, reportedly said the singer should be torn limb from limb. Miss Feraci, back home in Van Muys, California, expressed dismay at the reaction.

[Miss Feraci] I think it's pretty incredible that the wife of the Attorney General of the United States of America, the man who stands for the law, would go back to before the law, you know, to the rack when she wants to really do somebody in physically.

[Blackburn] Miss Feraci says she was nervous before making her White House statement, but simply felt it had to be done.
