Two anti-war protesters greeted Pat Nixon yesterday with personal pleas to have the bombing of North Vietnam halted.

"Your husband calls himself a Quaker and yet he has dropped more bombs than any man in history," said one protester who identified himself as Bob Dickerson, 56. of Philadelphia.

Pausing briefly, Mrs. Nixon replied:

"Then you'd just better read your history."

Later, a bearded youth, who said his name was Anthony Casey, 25, grabbed her hand and pleaded:

"Let's stop the bombing, please. Let's let the children live." Mrs. Nixon walked on and did not respond.

The First Lady's welcome, overall, was a friendly one.

However, there was a brief fracas as Mrs. Nixon was escorted to a waiting auto by Mayor Frank Rizzo for the ride back to a helicopter.

A picket holding an antiwar sign was pushed over a barricade by Nixon supporters.

Police made no arrests.

Mrs. Nixon was in Philadelphia to receive the "First Lady" award from the Golden Slipper Square Club, a Masonic group.

The award was a silver replica of the ink stand used to sign the Declaration of Independence.
