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Nixon's Daughter to Rely on Vote

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Mrs. Edward F. Cox, President Nixon's eldest daughter, declared yesterday that, although the pre-election polls were encouraging, "the only poll that really counts is the vote on election day."

"Everything looks great, but I'm not taking anything for granted," Mrs. Cox said as she warned other Republicans not to be complacent.

Wearing a bright red princess-line coat and white, knee-high boots, the President's daughter started her news conference at the

Roosevelt Hotel by apologizing to reporters jamming a second-floor corridor at the hotel for being nearly a half-hour late.

Then, never losing her smile, she fielded a series of questions.

"Peace is the number one issue in the campaign," she said.

On the current Vietnam peace negotiations, Mrs. Cox said that "the talks have now reached the stage where a few details just have to be settled."
