**Nixons End
Their Stay
In Florida**

Key Biscayne, Fla.

President Nixon attended church near his vacation home and relaxed in sunny 80-degree weather yesterday as he awaited the return from Vietnam of his peace envoy, General Alexander M. Haig Jr. *WED & 4:30*

Making his first public appearance since he arrived in Florida Wednesday, Mr. Nixon sat in a fourth-row pew at the Key Biscayne Presbyterian Church and listened to the Rev. John Huffman urge the congregation to "give life everything you've got — go for broke."

White House spokesmen said Mr. Nixon worked on plans for reorganizing the federal government earlier in his Florida stay. But his weekend schedule seemed to emphasize relaxation.

Three White House aides, chief of staff H.R. Halde- man domestic council director John D. Ehrlichman and legal counsel John Dean III, were in Key Biscayne but no meetings were announced.

Henry A. Kissinger, Mr. Nixon's national security adviser, flew to New York Saturday for what was described as a "private weekend." There was no indication when Kissinger would return to Paris to resume peace talks with the North Vietnamese.

FAMILY

Mr. Nixon was accompanied to church by his wife, Pat, daughters Tricia Cox and Julie Eisenhower, son-in-law Edward F. Cox, and the President's friend C.G. (Bebe) Rebozo.

After the hour-long service, the minister escorted the first family outside into the hot sunshine. A crowd of about 100 applauded and received a wave from the President.

Before leaving, Mrs. Nixon said good-bye to the minister's preschool-age daughter and asked: "Give me a little kiss." The child shook her head no but Mrs. Nixon kissed her anyway.
