David Eisenhower Quits Sportswriting

David Eisenhower is abandoning his newspaper career as a baseball columnist with The Philadelphia Evening and Sunday Bulletin.

"His final column will appear Sunday," Bulletin Sports Editor Herb Stutz said yesterday. Since early May, President Nixon's son-in-law has penned a Sunday column about the Philadelphia Phillies.

Eisenhower, 25, who is married to Nixon's daughter Julie, begins law school studies at George Washington University tomorrow.

When The Bulletin named Eisenhower to its sports staff the paper drew wide attention and some criticism because the grandson of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower lacked newspaper experience.

Stutz said: "I would say considering his lack of background, he did fairly well. He had some columns that were very, very good. Why don't we just say that we were satisfied."
