Wanted at a Trial

David and Julie Eisenhower are being sought as witnesses in a Miami criminal case involving an alleged acquaintance, court records showed yesterday.

District of Columbia Superior Court Judge Harold H. Greene signed an order Tuesday for the Eisenhowers to appear before him November 26 to determine whether they should be ordered to serve as defense witnesses in the Florida case. 22 OCT

Florida Public Defender Phillip A. Hubbard filed an affidavit with Greene stating that the testimony of the Eisenhowers, former President Nixon's daughter and son-in-law, is needed in the trial of James A. Gokey, also known as Alan Durham, who is to be tried in Miami in December.

Court records here did not give any details of the Miami case, but the Washington Star-News said Gokey is charged with forging a \$4 million check after portray-

ing himself as an heir to a tobacco fortune when he sailed a 120-foot yacht into the Fort Lauderdale, Fla., harbor.

The public defender's affidavit said the Eisenhowers have known Gokey since 1970 and at some time this year they were guests of Gokey aboard a yacht in Fort Lauderdale.

"David and Julie Eisenhower can testify as to those meetings and thereby establish the defendant's state of mind," the affidavit said.
