## To Nancy Kissinger, Nixon Was 'Unstable'

Years before Charles W. Colson told newsmen last month that former President Nixon had called Secretary of State Kissinger "unstable," Nancy Kissinger was telling her future husband the same thing about Mr. Nixon, according to a rare interview with her by Marvin Kalb for the Ladies' Home Journal. Although little of the interview is in direct quotations, the magazine said Mrs. Kissinger had read and approved it editorially.

The former Nancy Maginnes, whose ringless wedding came during the second Nixon Administration, "often told her husband of her deep dislike and distrust" of the President, the magazine interview states. She thought it was his "instability," more than any other quality, that "led to his downfall."

Although Mrs. Kissinger was reported to "take a tough line" on Vietnam and the Communist world, she said she was "appalled, really" by Senator Henry M. Jackson when he criticized her husband for what she called "quiet" diplomacy. If there is no trust between the executive and legislative branches, Mrs. Kissinger said, "maybe Henry [Kissinger] is right; maybe we are really in bad trouble."
