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## May Day Leader Put Under Bail So He'll Appear Before Inquiry

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DETROIT, June 9—A Federal grand jury believed to be investigating the March 1 bombing of the United States Capitol acted today to insure that an organizer of the May Day protest in Washington would appear when it convened here next Monday.

Larry Canada, 29 years old, who put together the kitchens and supplies to feed the demonstrators last May, was ordered by a Federal judge here to post \$25,000 personal bond and to remain in Detroit until next Monday.

He is one of six radicals active in planning the May Day demonstrations in Washington who have been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury.

Ralph Guy Jr., United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan, at a hearing before Federal Judge John Feikens said today that the F.B.I. had evidence that Mr. Canada was preparing to flee to evade the grand jury and had taken steps to move his assets to a foreign country.

### Bail Is Lowered

Buck Davis, the defense lawyer, told the judge that Mr. Canada while on a trip had heard from a friend that he was being subpoenaed, had returned to Bloomington, Ill., and tried to get in touch with the Federal Bureau of Investigation so he could be served with the subpoena.

Mr. Canada was arrested yesterday at his parents' home in Bloomington for trying to evade the grand jury and held in \$100,000 bond by a local magistrate. Judge Feikens agreed to lower the bail today on Mr. Guy's recommendation.

Mr. Guy has repeatedly declined to say what the grand jury is investigating.

But Mr. Davis said today that Guy Goodwin, a special assistant to Attorney General John N. Mitchell, had come here to argue motions made for those who have been subpoenaed, and that he had also

appeared before grand juries in New York, Washington and Seattle. "We think these [grand juries] are not unrelated," Mr. Davis said.

Miss Leslie Bacon, the Government's chief witness in the investigation of the bombing, has appeared before the grand juries in Washington and Seattle but was jailed when she refused to answer a series of questions.

### Wife Also Subpoenaed

Today, Mrs. Cathy Canada, who is divorced from her husband, said in an interview at the court that she had been subpoenaed, too. The hearing disclosed that Larry Clark, whom Mrs. Canada identified as a business partner of her former husband, had also been subpoenaed.

Mrs. Canada, who was wearing a hand-dyed T-shirt and jeans and held her 2-year-old daughter, Avery, during the interview, said that she and her husband had grown up in Indiana. She said that they had lived on a communal farm that grew organic food near Needmore, Ind.

She said that she and her husband and 200 other radicals had gathered on the farm two weeks ago to discuss what they had accomplished in the May Day demonstrations and to plan other actions to stop the Vietnam War.

She said that the farm was under F.B.I. surveillance continually, and that he agents could have served the subpoena then.

Mr. Canada refused to make a statement when the judge gave him the opportunity to do so.

Mrs. Canada said that her husband had attended Bloomington High School, served two years in the Army and then went to the University of Indiana for two years. She said that he had been opposed to the war when she met him three years ago.
