## May Day Leader Put Under Bail So He'll Appear Before Inquiry

DETROIT, June 9—A Federal grand jury believed to be investigating the March 1 bombing of the United States Capitol acted today to insure that an organizer of the May Day protest in Washington would appear when it convened here next Monday.

Larry Canada, 29 years old, who put together the kitchens and supplies to feed the demonstrators last May, was ordered by a Federal judge here to post \$25,000 personal bond and to remain in Detroit until next Monday.

He is one of six radicals active in planning the May Day demonstrations in Washington who have been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury.

Ralph Guy Jr., United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan, at a hearing before Federal Judge John Feikens said today that the FB.I. had evidence that Mr. Canada was preparing to flee to evade the grand jury and had taken steps to move his assets to a foreign country.
