## SFExaminor JUL 1 5 1971 Detroit Bomb Quiz Confirmed

\*WASHINGTON — (AP) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover confirmed today what anti-war activists have claimed and the Justice Department has refused to acknowledge — a Detroit grand fury is investigating the March 1 bombing of the U.S. Capitol.

An Indiana man who helped organize the Mayday anti-war protests here was arrested as a material witness in the grand jury's investigation but has not been called to testify.

Larry E. Canada of Bloomington, Ind., has been quoted by friends in the anti-war movement as saying he would not answer questions when brought before the grand jury. Two other persons have been subpensed to appear.

Purpose Concealed

At the time of his arrest in late May, the Justice Department would not disclose the grand jury's purpose.

Justice Department officials expressed surprise when Hoover, in his annual

report today, said:
"The FBI has conducted widespread investigation into the bombing, and federal grand juries in Seattle and Detroit are considering evidence in this case."

The Seattle jury probe was acknowledged by the Justice Department only after another anti-war activist, 19 year old Leslie Bacon, was arrested here as a material witness last April.

Only One Called

Miss Bacon, who since has been charged with conspiring to bomb federal buildings in New York City, is the only person known to have been called in the Seattle inquiry.

She is free on bond after being held in federal custody for nearly two months.

The Hoover disclosure on the Detroit jury came in a section of the report entitled "New Left Terrorism."

The director noted that shortly after the blast, a group calling itself the "Weather Underground" claimed responsibility in letters to news media. The FBI has refused to comment on the authenticity of the letters.
