**BLACK PANTHERS SUE
BALTIMORE OFFICIALS**

BALTIMORE, Aug. 12 —The Black Panther party and a white lawyer awaiting retrial on accessory-to-murder charges filed suit against four Baltimore officials today asking \$1-million in damages and an injunction against continued surveillance of the party.

The suit alleges falsified and perjured evidence in the recent trial of the lawyer, Arthur Turco Jr., who is accused of being an accessory to the 1969 torture-murder of a Black Panther suspected of being a police informant, his first trial ended July 3 with a hung jury.

William M. Kunstler, Mr. Turco's attorney, said the suit would be followed by similar actions in other cities where there have been prosecutions of Panther party members and associates.

The suit was filed in Federal District Court. It charges

that Donald D. Pomerleau, the Police Commissioner; Milton B. Allen, the Baltimore State's Attorney; and two subordinates brought charges against Mr. Turco "in bad faith and without reasonable expectation of success in order to have a chilling effect" upon the exercise of constitutional rights.

The two subordinates are Hilary Caplan, assistant state's attorney, and Lieut. Col. Maurice Dubois of the police department.
