## Rap Brown Flown to Louisiana for

Shortly before dawn yesterday, H. Rap Brown was removed from Federal House of Detention on West Street—despite a court order barring his removal—and flown to Louisiana to face sentencing.

The court order, which barred the black militant's remove from the Department of Correction Brown had up. He suffered two wounds in the Red Carpet Lounge on West 85th Street.

Brown, the former chairman of the defunct Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, has also been indicted in Maryland on charges of inciting to riot and arson in distrubances that destroyed part of a Negro section of Cambridge, Md., in 1967.

He had been a fugitive from justice since April, 1970, when he failed to appear for his trial on the Maryland charges in Brown the Shortly before dawn yester.

Mr. Kunstler had tried to keep the 28-year-old Brown in the Red Carpet Lounge on West 85th Street.
