SFChronicle OCT 5 1972 Grand Jury Witnesses-3 Win Delay

Three witnesses subpoenaed to testify before a federal grand jury, reportedly investigating the Weatherman group, got a one-day delay here yesterday.

U.S. District Judge Robert F. Peckham set a hearing for them at 10 a.m. tomorrow for a full discussion of the legality of the proceedings.

Their attorneys question the government's right to offer their clients limited immunity, as opposed to full immunity. They also seek to know what law violations the grand jury will investigate.

The three witnesses are Daniel R. Rosenberg, a San Francisco conservationist; Howard J. Berg, a Minneapolis engineer and Phillip Craven. a public health service doctor in Puerto Rico.

All three declined to answer grand jury questions yesterday. The questions were not made public.

Their attorneys speculated that the inquiry is into activities of the Weatherman, which is a splinter group of the Students for a Democratic Society.

If the three witnesses are granted immunity and refuse to answer grand jury questions, they may be held in contempt and put in jail until they answer.

After Judge Peckham set tomorrow morning's hearing, the grand jury delayed quizzing of another ten witnesses until 10:30 a.m. that day.
