## Data on Reporter Phone Calls Foug DEC 2 3 1973

A group of editors and reporters has demanded that American Telephone & Telegraph Co. stop its practice of disclosing records of reporters' telephone calls.

The demand came in a letter of to AT & T Chairman John DeButts signed by representation.

The letter, written by the committee's lawyer, threatened "appropriate legal action" if AT & T and its operation of secretly divulging to law enforcement agencies records that could identify confidential news sources.

AT & T has told the Federal local calls available to investigators, according to the letter.
