'Angela Trial Jailbreak Plot'

The state attorney general's office in San Francisco today awaited a visit from a Los Angeles lawyer who claims he has information that a former Santa Clara County jail inmate was offered \$1000 to stage a jailbreak during the Angela Davis trial.

'Will Listen'

Attorney General Evelle Younger said he has assigned Deputy Attorney General John Murphy to take the information from attorney Victor Reichman, who is representing the unidentified ex-inmate.

"I don't know what infor-

mation Reichman has or if judge grant it," said Younhis client has any information," said Younger. "Mr. Murphy will just listen."

"If there is any substance to Reichman's story," Younger added, "the matter will be referred to the Santa Clara County district attorney for appropriate action."

The ex-inmate, according to Reichman, is seeking immunity and wants to tell his story because he didn't get the \$1000 he was promised.

"If the district attorney wishes to grant immunity for getting the information. he must take the matter to a superior court and have a ger. "I see no involvement by this office."

The attorney general said he would be "perfectly happy" if he never had to use the name of Angela Davis again.

'Serious Matter'

Reichman said he regarded his client's information as "a very delicate and serious matter."

He pointed out that eight of the 12 jurors who heard the murder-conspiracy against Miss Davis witnessed the attempted Santa Clara County jailbreak last March 28.
