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A CAMDEN SUSPECT LINKED TO 2D RAID

U.S. Tells Court a Leader Spoke of Media, Pa., Role

The man identified by Federal agents as the "ringleader" of the recent abortive raid on the Selective Service office in Camden, N. J., was named in court there yesterday as a participant in the raid on the Media, Pa., office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in March. March.

Joseph F. Audino, an assistant United States Attorney, said during a bail-reduction hearing in Federal District Court that John P. Grady, 46 years old, had told an F.B.I. informant that he had taken part in the Media raid, in which about 1,000 documents were stolen. stolen.

Mr. Grady, said by the F.B.I. to be the organizer and architect of the Aug. 22 attempt to duplicate the Media raid in Camden, had been held in \$150,000 bail, the highest set for any of the 28 persons indicated cated.

20 Arrested at Site

He was one of 20 persons, including two Roman Catholic priests, a Lutheran "street minister"e and seven women, who were arrested by F.B.I. agents either inside the building that houses the draft office or nearby, in the early hours of the morning.

The 20, plus eight others, were indicated by a Federal grand jury Friday on charges of conspiracy; 21 of the group were also charged with breaking into the building, unlawfully removing public records, and related criminal acts. Seven of those charged are still being

and related criminal acts. Seven of those charged are still being sought by the authorities.

Mr. Grady's bail was cut to \$75,000 yesterday by Federal Judge Mitchell H. Cohen. Two other defendants, the Rev. Edward J. Murphy, 34, of New York City, and Mrs. Martha Shemeley, 34, of Hi-Nella, N. J., were released in the custody of Msgr. Salvatore J. Adamo, the editor of the Camden diocesan newspaper. newspaper.

Many of those arrested in connection with the Camden incident had histories of involvement with the Catholic antiwar movement. Two have been cited for contempt for refusing to testify before a Federal grand jury in Harrisburg, Pa., investigating the alleged conspiracy involving the Rev. Philip Berrigan and 12 others.

Grady's Involvement
Mr. Grady had been active in the "Harrisburg 13" defense committee. According to Mr. Audino, Mr. Grady also told the informant that he had participated in 14 draft-board raids as well as the one on the F.B.I. office in Media.

Much of the F.B.I.'s success in the Camden raid was evidently traceable to an informant, identified only as "reliable" in the government complaint and believed by many to be a

in the government complaint and believed by many to be a Camden man, Robert W. Hardy, who has refused to deny the accusation.

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
