# Firmer Control Of FBI Mapped

WASHINGTON—(UPI)—A Democratic planning group that included a former deputy to J. Edgar Hoover recommended yesterday that the FBI and its surveillance practices be placed under firmer supervision by Congress and the executive branch.

The report, prepared for the 1972 Democratic Convention Platform Committee, said the FBI "has gone 50 years without a full public accounting, particularly of unjustified political surveillance."

It said a hard look should be taken at "the bureau's archaic assumptions and practices of individual privacy and political liberty."

### Before Death

The recommendations were drafted before Hoover's death Tuesday after nearly 48 years as FBI director. The panel was headed by Sen. Adlai Stevenson III (D-Ill.) and include Courtney Evans, a former deputy FBI director.

The panel, the Democratic Policy Council's intelligence and security planning group advocated creation of a congressional watchdog committee to include members of the House and Senate judiciary, appropriations and foreign affairs committees.

### Quoted

Evans was quoted as saying:

"A way must be found to maintain the integrity of the FBI at the same time providing policy guidance and direction in security and intelligence investigations, particularly in areas where there is likely to be a legitimate difference between freedom for individual citizens and security for the government itself."

The report cited "the untouchable status of the FBI leadership with its painful implications for the unresponsiveness of the FBI either to modern management practices or to a proper concern for the protection of individual rights."

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
