WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—Clarence
M. Kelley said today that he did not intend to resign as Director of the Federal
Bureau of Investigation despite indications that President-elect Jimmy Carter
might want to name his own chief.

"I have said many times I am not going
to resign," Mr. Kelley told a reporter.
He added that he had not changed his
mind. Asked whether he would resign
if requested by Mr. Carter, the Director
replied, "When that comes up, I'll address
it then."

Campaigning in Connecticut in September, Mr. Carter said that he would have
dismissed Mr. Kelley if he had been President and known the facts behind allegations against the Director at the time.
But Mr. Carter stopped short of saying
he would discharge Mr. Kelley as President.

When he first became director, Mr. Kelley had drapery valances built in his living room by bureau employees. He said that the work was done without his knowledge. He reimbursed the Government \$355 for labor and materials.
